- Not a 5 star hotel, but very comfortable and nicely located.
- Staff were excellent when called upon for help.
- The business center was useful & it was good to have free internet access
- Room rate was appropriate x 2 responses

- It's a very average hotel and I was surprised it was not on the water but it was clean and reasonably priced.
- Restaurant there was poor.
- The location was not convenient to the airport, but it is where it is.
- I would take off points because there were problems with reserving my room. (The website did not work, and the initial reservation had a mistake.)
- It was a beautiful Resort
- The room was very nice x 4 responses
- The staff left a lot to be desired, including the Manager. The issue that came up may have been something I will laugh about??? never should have come up in the first place, and was never settled to our satisfaction.
- At Check Out, had to spend a long time discussing the bill, to avoid being overcharged.
- The banquet staff was very good.
- Several of the waitstaff, in the restaurant, were rude and obnoxious. This didn't spoil the Conference, as I love Nevil Shute and all my friends.
- Apparently lots of folks, but not me, got upgraded.
- Their cancellation policy needs greater flexibility and is inconsistent.
- Hotel rooms were large and comfortable, but this was all let down by the rude and uninterested staff
- nice conference facilities, nice restaurant
- Very good generally. I was particularly impressed that staff were in the conference room before breakfast on the Wednesday morning to help me set up for my presentation. They really were most helpful.
- The rate seemed high, but it's quite likely that this was the best available rate in the area.
- An in-room tea/coffee pot would have been nice. For tea drinkers this won't be an issue in Australia because even the most humble of lodgings there comes with an electric jug to heat water for tea, and usually a fridge for the milk. Of course this doesn't take care of the coffee drinkers, but you can't please everyone.
- I found the staff to be exceptionally friendly, helpful, and quick to respond to problems. For example, when there were no knives for the jam with the scones, all I had to do was mention it to the first person I saw and he took care of it immediately.
- It probably is impossible to find a hotel that pleases everyone.
- I know that in Oz Dan went to great lengths to find the best available location, but of course there were problems and complaints, and there were those in the group who expected him to take care of every little thing that came up. This really detracted from his ability to fully enjoy and participate in the activities or to attend to other pressing requirements. Maybe it would help for there to be a designated hotel liaison person in Alice to take some of the burden of logistics and complaints off of the event manager.

- Welcome reception very good - Not sure about the Ice Breaker Game - good idea but not sure how well it worked.
- There was no cheating of course was there - JEAN PAGET!
- OK, but I would have preferred wine to the Sangria and punch that was served.
- I don't generally care for icebreaker games and only half-heartedly participated in this one, but I appreciate the intent and energy that went into it. I felt somewhat grumpy and disconnected during the reception, I think partly because the room was cold and a bit stark. I get cold easily and don't care for air conditioning. I realize that some people have the opposite preference. After that first night I knew to carry a sweater, so the rest of the time was O.K.
- Well done. As intended, the Ice Breaker Game got everyone talking to one-another.
- Some thoughts about Welcome Receptions in general-- The one at the Centennial was magical. The energy was sky-high and people were reluctant for it to end. I'm not sure quite why-- all we had was a standard hotel ballroom with a bunch of tables and chairs and a few welcoming remarks. I think it mostly had to do with the newness--all these people were discovering for the first time that there were lots of others who shared their passion for Nevil Shute. At Oz, that newness was gone to an extent, but I think that having the "Friends of Nevil Shute" panel that first afternoon really got things started off in a strong way. The reason that time slot was originally chosen was that the rest of the week was full. But I think it worked well to start right off with something meaty.

- There were fine, although many finished early.
- You could adjust time by having more sessions and less standing around time.
- Give each speaker the option of 75 or 90 minutes.
- Tea breaks and refreshments were excellent.
- A session where Fred Erisman talks could never be too long
- It's funny--at OZ I sometimes felt that the talks were a bit too long, but in Cape Cod the time passed quickly and I was sometimes sorry to have the sessions end.
- I personally would prefer to have the time a bit less tightly scheduled so that there would be time to take a walk, etc. But then I realize that there are those who want to pack in as much as they can.
- Perhaps more flexibility might be accommodated for conference presentations. Rather than schedule all sessions to run the same length, perhaps the speakers should be sounded out regarding how much time they need to make their presentation, and sessions lengths might be adjusted accordingly. For example, I sensed that John Anderson could have used a bit more time for his presentation to include additional time for Q&A. Also, the reading session might have been extended a bit longer.

10) How comfortable were you during the conference?

- I do not recall any problems with comfort x 2 responses
- In the larger room we should have all had tables to rest against for writing as at UK2003 x 3 responses.
- Generally fine, esp. once we moved to the bigger room.
- Fine – acoustics were good, meeting rooms comfortable etc. Nothing that I saw fit to criticise.
- Indeed all aspects of comfort attracted my favourable comment.
- First morning too warm and then could not hear so well
- Seats in smaller room were HARD!
- Blooming uncomfortable. The small room was diabolical and inappropriate. Why did we have to move back into it?
- We weren't really too hot in the first room, but it was a blessing to be moved to the larger room where the seats were wider, more cushioned, and the elbow room more---the first room would have been difficult to sit in all day for the whole conference.
- The room for Monday and Wednesday was very good; Thursday's room was less comfortable.
- The meals were quite good
- Chairs and acoustics left a little to be desired
- There should have been a roving microphone for audience questions.
- The chairs in the small room were very uncomfortable and the room too crowded. The large room was quite nice and the chairs comfortable.
- The little room was uncomfortable, but the big room was excellent.
- The larger room used on Monday PM & Wednesday was much better seating in the smaller room was too hard.
- Seats were pretty hard , the first (small) room got pretty warm.
- Thank goodness we moved from the stuffy hot room to the larger room. That room and the chairs were much better.
- I was quite comfortable except for the cold temperatures during some sessions. I know that some people complained about sometimes being too hot, so again, you can't please everyone. I never had any trouble hearing, but I know that some people did. This is always a challenge. From past experience I suppose it would be a good idea to have a backup P.A. system available.
- Also, the chairs in the large conference room (where we were sent because of temperature problems) were more comfortable than the round chairs used in our assigned conference room.
- Very uncomfortable for much of the time
- Meeting room we used most was too small.
- Chairs were uncomfortable.
- Space and tables are essential for drinks, note taking, doodling etc.
- Air conditioning erratic.
- Mobile microphones are an absolute MUST requirement. They were either not requested or not available in the assigned room. When we moved to the larger room with sound facilities the mobile mics generally did not work. I missed most of the questions which makes the answers difficult to comprehend.

- All of the problems with the comfort of the meeting room (lack of working microphones, uncomfortable seating, lack of tables in the conference, etc) should have all been sorted out in advance, or as a minimum sorted during the conference. However, despite problems, there was no indication that anyone was trying to sort them.
- Would have been nicer if the organisers sent out more ongoing information in the build-up to the conference.
- From a participant's point of view, it was flawless. Kudos to Art and his band of stalwarts.

- Not about organisation, maybe just implementation as noted.

22) Do you feel that overall the conference was good value for money?

- 10/10 x 3 responses
- Yes x 16 responses
- Absolutely x 2 responses
- Very much so, especially if one participated in everything.
- I thought that the value—meals, excursion, stones, etc.—was fine.
- \$50 too much.
- When I registered, I thought it was a little expensive, but I did not know it was going to include the lunches. With the meals it was a very good value.
- Do we have an accounting of how the funds were allocated? This would be most useful for the planning of future conferences. How much went to direct conference expenses at the hotel (conference facilities, banquet, lunches, etc.)? How much went to conference materials (conference book, conference bag)? Where were the remaining funds allocated? If this is "our" society, this information should be available.

23) Would you have preferred a cheaper conference using a more basic hotel and without extra bits, such as gifts, scones & cakes?

- Cheaper would only cheapen the whole experience. I really enjoy the venues that have been chosen for our conferences. They are memorable and not just *Super 8* Motels. I think we have had good value for our money at each of the conferences I have been to.
- Fine with me. I don't do scones or cakes. Don't need gifts. I think the CapeCodder was a bit overpriced. A Holiday Inn would have been fine. I think the Cape Codder did a good job though.
- Not unless the basic hotel had "character" and charm.
- One problem is that I wore all those scones and cakes for 2 months afterward, so sure, if you could trim the cost down with a few less scones, my waistline will appreciate it!
- I don't know how much difference \$ made in who could attend.
- It may have brought more people. Were there many who did not come due to cost?
- The "little things" help to give each meeting its distinctiveness.
- The major expense of a conference is usually travel. I think it would be a mistake to try to scrimp on hotel, food, etc., to shave a few dollars off the price.
- Would have been nice to have real scones and clotted cream as is the tradition at Shute gatherings.
- Having less in the way of gifts and amenities would have been fine with me. The trade-off is that in order to get the comfortable conference room, the attentive staff, the good sound system and climate control, etc., it's usually necessary to go to a "conference" hotel which automatically becomes less basic. Shopping for a location is always a challenge and there will always be trade-offs. You just do the best you can and then accept that people will always have some complaints.

- The innovative contest produced by the Colorado Chapter really added to the whole meeting.
- The Booklet (with schedule, abstracts, etc.) was very impressive. I have never seen anything this nice after attending a number of professional society meetings over the years.
- The bag with the list of Shute's books was also a very nice thought.
- It was a memorable experience to participate in the Gathering with so many interesting people and to work with Art and Joan Cornell.
- Joan and Art did a marvellous job of organizing the conference and it was great to meet old friends.
- While interesting, I found the session of reading passages less useful than the others.
- The conference was absolutely excellent! Each of the 4 has had its own special feature or "feel," and I am glad that the format has not become routine. In this case, along with the excellent program and speakers, what stood out included the VInland theme (with the play reading), the ice-breaker and the artifact contest, the panel discussion, the individual readings, and the session on bringing Shute to young people. Keep thinking of new twists!
- Overall, all the features of the meeting showed a lot of thought by Art, Joan, and all the others who made the preparations - and this is what made it such an outstanding meeting.
- The tea in Art's backyard was a very nice touch, as were Art's personal connection to some of the places we visited on the excursion, e.g., the "marriage tree". The conference exceeded expectations for many of us, I am sure. Art, Joan, and all others who were involved in the event deserve our sincere thanks for a job well done!

- The Gathering was better than I had imagined, and I want to thank Art and Joan and all involved. It was an unforgettable experience.

FUTURE CONFERENCES

1) What types of things can be done to make the next conference better?

- All of the presentations were great.
- The only problems I had was hard seating, stairs and hearing. A lot of the people there are not on the young side and some have difficulty with stairs, so a single level may be more pleasant.
- I have difficulty in separating voices against background noise, and hearing low voices. A better amplifying system would help. One of my customers rented wireless mikes for a seminar that were available to had people for questions, so everyone could hear both sides, it worked very well. I don't think I was alone with the hearing difficulties.
- If one were to aim high, some sort of interactive presentation such as some I have recently seen in the new Abe Lincoln museum at Springfield Illinois would be wonderful. (One could weave around the man NSN using a full length photograph of Norway.)
- Get the word out sooner as to what the program will be. I know this is easier said than done, but the specific proposed program is one of the principal factors in determining whether someone will want to attend.
- Well, we will answer this as to what would make it easier/more likely for us to attend the next one, but as for "better", Art and Joan did a totally fantastic job and so "better" is not really a question we could contemplate.
- In thinking ahead, as below, yes, we would like to attend the one in AU if we can. We attended CC because we felt it might well be our only chance to attend an international Shute gathering because of time, money and proximity. However, both of us as well as one or two other friends/family (who are familiar with but not immersed in Shute) have wished to visit Australia. So, if we can swing it time-wise, financially, and within health and family obligations, we would like very much to do so. One of the destinations in our plan, of course, would be Alice Springs, however, this would be our one and probably only trip so we would want to be able to plan to see a bit of Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide, and New Zealand, so the conference would be only part of the reason for the journey. It would be nice to find others who might want to make similar plans. Having preliminary information as soon as possible would be a great help. We anticipate seeing Laura in February at our Montclair meeting and would possibly be willing to help with the planning.
- There are many unpublished works (Flight Log, Reports on the build up to DDay, etc.) which have not been discussed; I would suggest some of theseas being interesting.
- New, different types of presentations
- Just more comfortable seating!
- A couple of suggestions: Early in the conference have a short session in which each exhibitor stands up and in 5 minutes or less describes his or her contribution to the exhibit hall. I think this would make the exhibits more useful.
- I think it would be good to have the conference end at mid-day. This would seem to give more flexibility in terms of transportation. Depending on location and circumstances, there could be an optional excursion or mini-excursion after the conference officially ended for those who wanted to stay a little longer.
- You might consider overlapping the weekend, say Friday through Monday. This might make it easier for people with jobs to attend.
- As for length, I think the present format is just right.
- Cutting back on the excursion could make it a bit cheaper, but that's the only place I'd look at for savings. The balance of presentations between more and less technical is just right.
- It will be interesting to hear from folks who did not attend as to why.
- Personally, I enjoy conferences where one afternoon and one evening are free. Everything was fine from my perspective.
- Ask people in advance what they want when planning the conference
- The Vinland the Good reading was a nice change of pace; I can think of other passages in the canon (NOT just Green Island) that would lend themselves to comparable readings. I also liked the "favorite passages" session; the panel discussion was stimulating and substantial, but would have been even better had comments and discussion focused upon a single theme, issue, or title that we knew about in advance. On the one hand, the new ideas (readings of passages, the play, Lillian's talk) were fun, so more new ideas might also be good. On the other hand, what we had this time worked very well.
- If anyone has good ideas, creativity should be encouraged.
- Follow-ups on previous presentations might be good.

- The only thing I would suggest is a more appropriate location. However, in the case of Cape Cod 2005, that wasn't an option. We tried for the west coast where we would have been able to tour the forests, lumber camps, Boeing, etc., and would have been closer to Heather Mayfield and Richard Bach, increasing the chances that they could attend. No one would come forward to manage an event there. In the final analysis, if Art and Joan hadn't agreed to manage the convention, and we hadn't agreed to have it in Cape Cod, there would not have been a 2005 event.
- Movies: Schedule simultaneous movie sessions with provisions to screen as many of the Shute movies as possible. Poll attendees (at the event?) to determine which movies to screen and re-screen and when.
- Excursions: Continue to visit places mentioned in Shute books; also continue to visit places associated with Shute's life. For example, a visit to a sheep ranch might be appropriate to an Alice Springs conference.
- Show and Tell: Bring more people to conferences who knew Shute (comments by Barbara Niven at the Cape Cod Conference were most interesting). Perhaps Australia would offer the best opportunity since this is where he lived out his final years? More Shute artifacts in the Exhibition Hall would also be great.
- Presentations: Include sessions featuring readings and panel discussions in future conferences; these went over very well with everyone! Encourage more of the great presentations and speakers we've had at the last two conferences (the only ones we've attended).
- Preserve Conference Proceedings: Try to capture presentations for posterity, either on audio (as was done in Albuquerque) with copies of presentation materials, or on video. Many of these presentations are one off opportunities for insights into Shute's life and mind; it would be great if they could be saved.
- Conference Theme: Having a major theme for a conference seems to work well, e.g., An Old Captivity for Cape Cod - use of the large hand-drawn map in Art's introduction, focus of several presentations, focus of bus excursion. "A Town Like Alice" would provide a similar focus for an Alice Springs conference.
- Not very many of us have been fortunate enough to have attended all the Shute Conferences. Future conferences should not hesitate to return to places visited during prior conferences, or to redo presentations made during early conferences (e.g., Albuquerque, Melbourne).
- Perhaps a day longer would be better, many people have usually travelled a long way.
- For those people not wanting to dash away immediately after the Conference perhaps some local communal trips could be made available for those who wish to continue enjoying each other's company and see more of the area.
- Discover and invite some of NSN's old surviving friends from Langwirran area who knew him personally (I thought Barbara Niven's talks were incredible). The Foundation might offer to subsidise their costs if necessary and ask for a talk from them. (Assuming it is in Australia)
- I would like to see more details and promotion of the Foundation Scholarships and information presented in the display room about past recipients etc.
- I like the idea of the discussion panel, however I would prefer it if questions could be submitted to the panel BY ATTENDEES by email in advance of the Conference. I believe those should then be the major questions addressed by the panel. If there are insufficient questions forthcoming then "arranged" questions should then be used as per CC 2005.
- I applaud the idea of 'follow ups' of previous presentations and believe they are well received. This has happened with John Anderson's DMWD work related to NSN at 3 conferences (including York) and they were still being acclaimed at CC 2005.
- The Discussion Panel, Personal Readings and Play were all innovations at CC 2005. I thought they brought a freshness to the format. I do not have any brilliant new ideas yet for the next International Conference, but I'll work on it! Oxford will be different again.
- I would have reservations about an excursion out of Alice Springs to Ayers Rock, etc. I've been to Alice Springs twice already without going to Ayers Rock, and can live quite well without that experience. Besides, there is no relation to Nevil Shute that I know of. The reason we didn't go there during our flyabout was that there was a huge airport landing fee. Also hotel reservations had to be made way in advance and couldn't be cancelled on short notice, so that gave us no flexibility for weather or other considerations. Lodging was also very expensive. I'm sure it's possible to do a day trip there by bus, returning to Alice the same day, but that doesn't appeal to me at all. I would be more interested in short outings to the NSN library, the swimming pool, etc. Maybe not all in one day, so that we could alternate between conference room presentations and outings.

2) Do you think you will attend the next conference if it is in Australia?

- Yes x 9 responses
- We hope to. I have been wanting to go to Australia since seeing a Eastman Kodak multimedia presentation on Australia in 1970.
- My wife and I hope so x 2 responses
- Definitely, God Willing
- Probably - God willing and the creek don't rise. It would be difficult for me to be away from my job for a long enough period of time to justify going to Australia but I will consider it.
- It would be hard to stay away.
- If time and money permit, we'll be there.
- Not sure yet
- I have concerns that the cost of transportation may limit attendance.
- It is improbable, although I might be persuaded to combine it with some other things I would like to do in Australia on my third trip there.
- Most unlikely
- Regretably, I'm 83 and my wife is 80, so I doubt it.
- Not likely, I have a reunion I am committed to. I wish I could.

- f) Other & Comments
 - Money: I would probably not have been able to attend, even if it was in the UK! I am self employed and it has been a difficult year.
 - In the end I guess it all boils down to this. Combination travel/conference cost, that is.
 - My wife works full-time, I do not. Our daughters are 10 and 12 with demanding after-school schedules and I am the primary chauffeur. Combined with my own schedule (which included a board meeting that week and a couple of evening rehearsals) it made travel to Cape Cod impractical and would have caused me to feel guilty about enjoying myself at the conference. I might have made a different decision if the Foundation's website and newsletter were not so complete and informative (not to mention the lists of yesteryear). Paradoxically, the prevalence of e-mail and the internet, which made it much easier to organize the conference, makes it relatively less rewarding to actually attend, since I'm confident that anything of significance presented at the conference will appear on the internet in due time. Nevertheless I should like it made known that even if I never attend a Shute conference, I appreciate highly that they are being held. Thus, I am grateful to you personally. One of these days (years) I do hope to attend a Shute gathering. Obviously it would be a good way to meet like-minded people and to answer the question, are these people really like me in significant ways other than that they, like me, think Shute a good writer? Thank you
 - For us it's timing - we travel overseas now and then but a Shute gathering would have to coincide with another trip, so it's luck of the draw.
 - Main reason for not going to Cape Cod was the cost/distance involved.
